Britain's hidden £30m flower farming industry gets official recognition — just in time for Chelsea

An industry dominated by women, built on birdsong and biodiversity, has spent years invisible to government statistics. That changes now.

Walk into a British flower farm in summer and the birdsong is almost deafening. But until this week, the Treasury couldn't hear it. The £30 million* a year generated by the UK's flower farming industry has, until now, been invisible, absorbed into the catch-all figures of broader agriculture, its contribution uncoun­ted, its flower growers unrecognised.

That changes today. Flowers from the Farm, the trade body representing over a thousand British flower growers, has been awarded dedicated Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes, the formal economic identifiers that allow a sector to exist, officially, in the eyes of government, funders and policymakers.

The announcement comes as Flowers from the Farm prepares to exhibit at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show, Britain's most prestigious horticultural stage.

"I have been proud to work with growers and Flowers from the Farm to press the Treasury to properly recognise this sector.

"Securing a dedicated SIC codes means their contribution can finally be measured, supported and championed. These are businesses that not only create jobs and drive local growth but also enhance biodiversity and support more sustainable land use. It is only right that their work is recognised at the heart of government, and I will continue to make the case for the support they deserve."

The award of SIC codes, secured with persistent backing from Liberal Democrat MP Sarah Dyke, is more than a bureaucratic milestone. For the first time, the economic contribution of British flower farming can be tracked, measured, and used as the basis for funding applications, academic research, and government support.

An industry of women, land and wildlife

Eight in ten members of Flowers from the Farm are women. In the UN International Year of the Woman Farmer, the recognition is particularly resonant.

Beyond economics, the new classification unlocks the possibility of formally measuring what flower farmers already know: that sustainable flower farming is good for the land. Flowers from the Farm is now positioned to research and quantify the Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) that flower farming delivers - a significant development at a time when BNG frameworks are reshaping how land is valued in Britain.

Unlike schemes that require land to be set aside and taken out of production, flower farming works the land. It sustains rural employment, supports pollinators, and generates economic activity in communities where agricultural jobs have long been in decline.

What comes next

With formal recognition secured, Flowers from the Farm will now move on to designing qualifications for young people entering the industry, creating pathways that connect aspiring growers with landowners, and building the supply of high-quality, UK-grown flowers that an increasingly sustainability-conscious market is demanding.

British Flowers Week, an annual national celebration of homegrown blooms, is less than a month away. For the first time, the industry it celebrates is officially on the map.

* Data based on estimates from Flowers from the Farm data. Its 2025 report showed the average income was £33,600 per member, from a total membership base of 1000+, therefore totalling £33,600,000. This demonstrates significant economic value to the UK economy, both through wholesale and retail, consumer-facing events and much more, typically focused on rural areas.

The RHS Chelsea Flower Show takes place on 19th to 23rd June 2026. Flowers from the Farm will be exhibiting in the Great Pavilion at stand GPE063.

British Flowers Week takes place between 15th to 21st June 2026.

About

Flowers from the Farm is the UK trade body for cut flower and foliage growers. Its membership produces British-grown flowers sold through farm shops, farmers markets, floristry studios and direct-to-consumer channels across the country.

SIC (Standard Industrial Classification) codes are used by UK government and Companies House to classify business activity. Without sector-specific codes, flower farming has historically been counted within broader agricultural categories, making it impossible to measure its true economic footprint.
